## On Thin Ice: It Can't Die – Found Poetry

Use the chapters that are told from the perspective of the bear to create *Found Poems*. Since these chapters are very descriptive, they work well to create this type of poetry

Example:

1. Choose a selection from the book: From the chapter *Hateful Animals* p. 189. (Be sure to note what chapter page and paragraph you are using.) For example:

There it is, lying <u>close to the water</u>'s edge. A nice, <u>fat seal asleep</u> in the spring sun. Its snores make <u>your heart race</u> and saliva pores into your mouth. You submerge completely. You slowly scull <u>forward</u>, keeping the seal's dark form in view while underwater. You swim with in inches of the ice, then <u>explode out</u> of the water in <u>one giant leap</u>.

- 2. Select descriptive words or phrases to create a found poem.
  - close to the water fat seal asleep your heart races saliva pores slowly forward explode out one giant leap
- 3. After creating several found poems try to write a 'Parallel Poem' with the same format as your favorite found poem. For example instead of a polar bear hunting a seal, consider a dog hunting a sik sik (ground squire). For example:

on the rig of a hill sik sik suns your tail wags crouch low sneaking lower sik sik yelps race to the hole 4. Be ready to share your poems with the rest of your class.
