
What is an Essay?

<u>Definition</u>: An essay is a piece of writing that is an attempt to communicate something about **one idea**. It has several paragraphs that support a thesis- a statement of that one main idea that is the focus of the essay. Everything should relate to the thesis.

Structure: An essay has three main parts: an introduction, a body, and a conclusion.



The introduction introduces what the essay is going to be about; it is the "blueprint" or main plan for what comes next. It is something like, "This is what I am going to say and how I am going to say it." The first sentence, or opening sentence, is a general statement, but it is also a "hook" that catches the reader's attention and engages his interest. The next few sentences should relate to the topic of the essay and

gradually introduce the reader to the supporting points that will become topic sentences for the paragraphs in the body of the essay. It is something like, "these are the points or ideas that I will use to support my thesis." Then state the thesis that is going to be proved or explained.

The body of an essay has one purpose-to prove/support the thesis. It is something like, "This is what I am saying and why I believe my thesis." It usually has at least three paragraphs that support the thesis and explain it in detail. Each paragraph begins with a topic sentence that makes a point or argument in support of the thesis, that point is supported with examples/quotes, and those examples are then analysed with clear connections to the thesis. In other words, everything should explain, support, and connect to the thesis. Each paragraph ends with a concluding sentence and with transitional sentences connecting each one so that the essay flows logically from one paragraph to the next. A topic sentence can function as a transitional sentence if it echoes the previous paragraph while also introducing the next point to be analysed.

The conclusion is the final paragraph in an essay. It needs its own topic sentence that is a restatement of the thesis, a summary of the points made (how the thesis has been proved) and a conclusion about those points. Do not introduce any new ideas that have not been discussed in the body paragraphs. The concluding sentence is a final statement that leaves the reader with something to think about, or inspires some sort of further thought or action on the topic.
